- EAEA proposes to create a Learning Europe, a knowledge society that can deal with current challenges
- The theme: "The Power and Joy of Learning"
- The Manifesto describes how adult education can answer current challenges and provides concrete examples from Europe
- The challenges: growing inequalities, unemployment, demographic change... as well as migration

The Manifesto: adult education and migration (2016)

WHY?

- Adult education can play a crucial role in the current refugee situation in Europe
- Language and basic skills training can help migrants become active citizens

HOW?

- Good practice example from Ireland: Fatima, a refugee from Afghanistan, took language classes but found them too segregated
- Fatima decided to take more classes and sit Physics and Chemistry in one year at Tullamore Further Education Centre
- Fatima is now fluent in English and motivated to still learn

Grundtvig Award 2016: Adult education and refugees

- Annual award recognizing excellence and innovation in adult education
- Different theme every year
- All best practice examples collected in a publication
- Three categories: international, European and national projects

International projects: winner

- St Andrew's Refugee Services (StARS), Cairo
- Huge interest in the Adult Education
 Programme (over 2,500 learners in 2015)
- A range of courses on computer skills, handicraft, English language...
- Increased confidence the most important outcome

European projects: winner

- TLC Pack, VHS Cham, Germany
- Project tackling demographic change, language problems and immigration by focusing on migrant caregivers
- Online multilingual platform developed
- Intercultural competences given a lot of attention
- The materials already included in some curricula in Europe

National projects: winner

- From Destruction to Creation. Integration and Development Centre for Information and Research/DVV International Ukraine
- Project focusing on the integration of internally displaced persons in their new communities
- 16 mini-grants for local initiatives in 11 regions in Ukraine
- Trainings and flash mobs on hate speech, street quests, art exhibitions... Many initiatives spontaneous
